Here are three different ideas to try:


 Use as an activity to stretch more able students. Some will be ready to use more advanced vocabulary than is already included in the other sections of the packet. Encourage descriptive vocabulary rather than simply naming.





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

- Print and laminate two copies. Use as a barrier game where a student makes a picture with the cut outs and then gives directions to another student.














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
