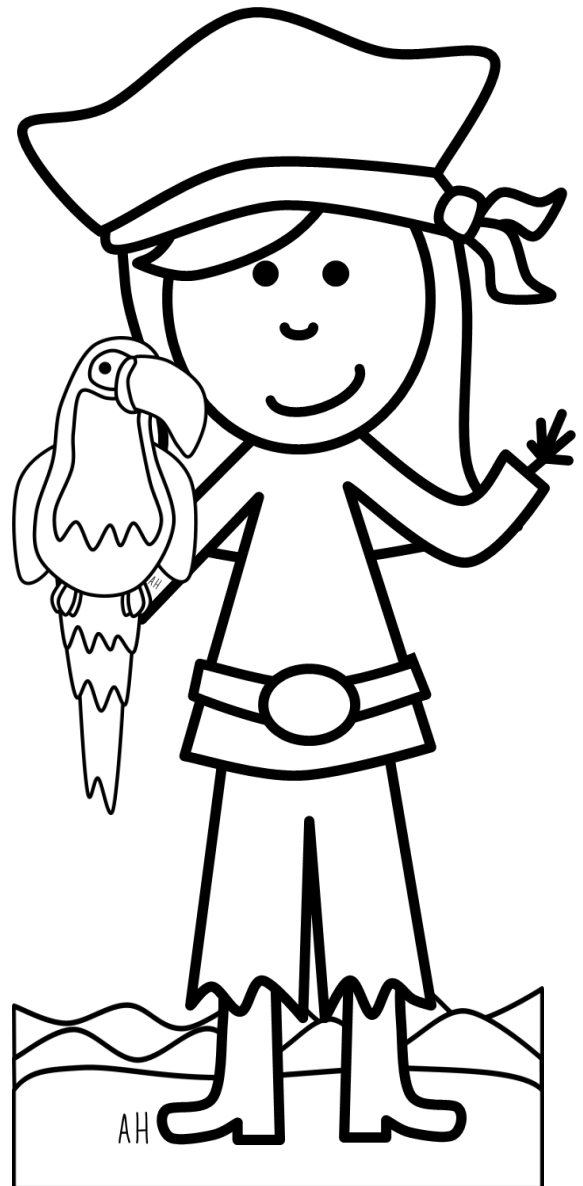
Vocabulary Cards
